

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HELLO & WELCOME TO PRIDE PLACE



Values, Money and Me is the UK's first free online teaching resource specifically designed to give young children a head start in life by helping develop their financial knowledge and abilities, as well as their attitudes and values towards money.

The learning resource is a fun, engaging, interactive real life financial educational platform for teachers to deliver for children KS1/2. It's the Community Social Responsibility movement to inspire the next generation.

This printable and innovative classroom resource is packed full of stories, quizzes, games and challenges for children to enjoy and learn; both in school and at home with parental participation.

All the curriculum maps are given for PSHE and Financial Capability. Lessons are introductions to philanthropy, entrepreneurship, volunteering and being environmentally conscious.

Children are encouraged to explore getting involved in entrepreneurship activities such as running their own charity fundraising events.

Values, Money and Me explores what money cannot buy, by considering the value of friendship, giving of their time and kindness. By understanding 'social capital' and the value of their participation with others they are able to see money in the context of being good citizens, friends and family members.

Financial knowledge and understanding is about helping children to understand the concept of money. It means having knowledge and understanding of the nature of money and insight into its functions and uses. Developing financial understanding is the first step in ensuring that young people leaving school have the skills required to deal with everyday financial issues. It will also help them to make informed decisions and choices about their personal finances.

Financial skills and **competence** is very much concerned with day-to-day money management and thinking about planning for the future. This means being able to apply knowledge and understanding of financial matters across a range of contexts: personal situations as well as situations beyond our immediate control. A financially competent person is able to identify and tackle problems or issues with confidence and is able to manage financial situations effectively and efficiently.

Financial responsibility is about the wider impact of money and personal financial decisions, not only for an individual's future, but also at a greater, societal level. It implies an understanding of how financial decisions can impact, not only on the person making the decision, but also on their family and community. Young people who are financially capable will be aware that financial decisions and actions are closely linked with value judgements of various kinds (social, moral, aesthetic, cultural, and environmental as well as economic) and therefore have social and ethical dimensions.





PRIDE PLACE CHARACTERS



The Pride Place characters help children to explore the world of money within the context of personal and ethical values. Children will begin to appreciate the, sometimes complex, emotional and moral dilemmas that we all face in relation to money. Children live in a world where their desires and values are influenced by many factors; family, peers, the media and the law.

Through the characters of the Pride Place Community, their lives and dilemmas children explore through their own experiences around money and how they feel and react to it. This is learnt through a range of tasks, plans and dilemmas faced by the characters that live in Pride Place.

Through the characters, their families and the situations they find themselves in, we are able to help children to explore and understand how the ever-changing adult world of money affects them.

It explores how they can take more responsibility for their own money and to consider the moral and ethical values they hold about it.

The fictitious world tackles a variety of issues and dilemmas that provide a multitude of opportunities for children to get involved, through group and classroom discussions to role play.

KSI











This unit centres on Lily and the moral dilemmas she faces as she tries to be popular at school by bringing the 'best' donation for the charity auction event.

LESSON I

Lily's Dilemmas

Using the interactive story, children explore the choices that Lily makes and the consequences of various options she may choose in relation to taking a valuable ring from her mother's jewellery box for the charity auction at school.

Pupils explore through discussion and role play.

LESSON 2

What Makes it Special?

By exploring objects in their own life (based on an item they will bring in from home, such as a photo or toy), children will begin to understand the sentimental and emotional value that people attach to objects and how this is sometimes as (or more) important than the monetary

They will consider the value of the experiences they attach to obiects.

LESSON 3

Things That Money Can't Buy

Children will explore the value of their actions and consider that some jobs or chores will be done for altruistic reasons or to add value to relationships, using the kindness calculator sheet.

This unit centres on Sue Lee and her friend Mrs. Goleska. When Mrs Goleska asks Sue to help her out by taking some old things to the charity shop she doesn't realise she has put her son's army service medal in the bag too. Mrs Goleska's son was lost in conflict overseas.

This unit explores the sentimental and emotional value of objects and how some things are priceless because of the associations they hold.

On completion of this unit the children will have explored a range of issues in relation to values, being caring, avarice, and motivations for getting and selling old or second hand items.

On completion of this unit children will have explored a range of issues in relation to behaviour and it's impact on others. It explores these moral perceptions about money within the context of citizenship, how our attitudes might differ in relation to friends or strangers and the morality of this.

Children are invited to explore the wider values relating to morality, relationships and communities.

Costing the Earth

Exploring energy saving, this activity flows from the story book A Fair Day's Pay.

It can also be done as a standalone activity to explore the cost of energy in the home. A Saving Energy Factsheet is provided for use in the classroom and at

Using the click and pop-up pictures, children explore the ways in which they can contribute to saving energy around the home (and even at school). Each pop-up offers advice on how they can make small changes that all add up to a big saving.

WANT IT

This unit centres on Tara and her mother Tara is now old enough to get some pocket money and to save up for things she may wish to buy.

On completion of this unit the children will have explored a range of issues in relation to realistic saving, earning, planning and budgeting. It uses the story along with the Spend and Save Calculator to encourage children to develop a sense of responsibility about earning and managing money and what it can buy.

LESSON I

Sharing the Chores/ Jobs at Home

Children explore being part of a family and the individual's contributions to the running of the household. They consider roles and responsibilities in the home and if and when young people should be paid, or not, for doing chores.

LESSON 2

Exploring Needs and Wants

Using a range of needs and wants, including basic human needs, children are encouraged to consider some of the priorities that adults may need to set when operating with limited funds and how this might affect them and their family.

LESSON 3

Spend and Save Calculator

Children explore how they might make, save and spend money, set goals for spending and create staged plans to reach goals. They will learn more about planning and choosing what to buy within a budget over time.



DO YOU NEED IT

This unit centres on the Deacon family and their loan dilemma. The children will explore the language associated with loans and the potential risks and consequences.

They will have the opportunity to calculate hypothetical loans and repayment for an electrical item. Children will also be able to research the cost and value of family activities.
