









Year 1 and Year 2 Non-fiction





To support teachers with selecting appropriate texts for their year groups, the list has been annotated to indicate suitability for Y1, Y2 or both. Teachers may find that earlier texts are more suitable for the beginning of the year while those towards the end of the list are more complex in either language or concepts and therefore could be more appropriate towards the end of the year. Texts noted specifically as Y1 or Y2 are particularly useful for teaching specific grammar objectives for that year group.






In all cases, teachers need to make text choices based on the individual needs of their classes: almost all of these texts have been used successfully across both year groups in different contexts.





Should this title go out of print, it is likely that others in the series will have similar text and sentence features and could be substituted.</p>	<p>Weather by Steffi Cavell-Clarke (First Science, The Secret Book Company)</p> <p>This is an excellent introduction to information texts - attractive and easy to navigate for Y1 but also a hybrid text (containing a set of instructions and a glossary) making it suitable for Y2 as well. The outcome is to write additional weather pages.
